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INTRODUCTION

Christians involved in sport often have difficulty knowing how their relationship with Christ relates to their sport. The Christian athlete faces several tough questions:

- What should be my motivation in competition?
- How do my faith and my sport mix?
- Will God keep me from getting injured in competition?
- Am I spending too much time on my sport?
- What differentiates competition that pleases God from that which doesn't please God?

The Principles that you are about to learn will hopefully guide you in answering these questions and many more. Each of the five principles takes a different story from the Bible and applies the Biblical principle from that story to sport and competition. They cover topics like: idolatry, motivation, identity, growth, pain and perspective.

As you experience these principles and begin to live them out, they can literally transform your life. Romans 12:1, 2 tells us that we should not try to conform to the pattern of the world, but instead be transformed by God's renewing truth.

The beautiful thing about these principles is that they are God's principles from His word and they don't just apply to sport. They can be applied to any area of life. So, don't limit them to your sports career. Apply them to your studies, business career, relationships, finances —every area of life.

THE AIA PRINCIPLES are:

The Gospel *applied* to sport,
The Gospel *experienced* through sport,
The Gospel *spoken* in the language of sport.





Audience of One Ao1

Are you ready to live and compete with a new perspective and a new audience?

We all live out our life in front of an audience. Whether it's neighbors, roommates, family, social media or fans in the stands. People watch and evaluate us everyday. It's easy to get caught up in trying to please these audiences. But you need to realize an amazing truth...that there has been Someone else watching you for a long time. The Almighty God, over all creation, made you and has seen everything you have ever done (*Psalm 139*). He really is your "Audience of One" as He watches everything you do.

God as your Audience of One doesn't mean that you are playing for God, in the sense that you must impress Him, as if His acceptance of you is based on your athletic performance. You may think that the harder you play the more God is pleased with you, like He is the heavenly scout watching your every play and, when you fail athletically, He drops his head and shakes it in disappointment. This is not the case at all.

You don't need to perform or compete in order to try and receive love. Check this...if you are surrendering your life to Jesus Christ, then God is fully satisfied with you. God's love for you is complete. He loves you unconditionally and lives in you eternally, because of what Jesus has done on your behalf through His life, death and resurrection. (Ephesians 2:8,9; Romans 8:1-4; 1 Corinthians 6:19) Your sin is forgiven and you are a new person, who is being renewed every single day (2 Corinthians 5:17; 4:16). You also have a new identity as a child of God. When you choose to listen to God's voice above all others and live in the identity that He gives you, then you will experience the true freedom that He created you for.

Every day and every play, you have the opportunity to respond to God with thankfulness for His love, through your attitude, effort,

focus and actions, in the arena of competition...as well as outside the arena (*Psalm 100:4*; *Colossians 3:23*; *Luke 10:27*). You don't need to be motivated by fear...fear of what your coaches will think, your teammates will think, scouts will think, or your family will think (1 John 4:18). You are now free to be motivated by God's love for you...because no matter what happens in your sport, you. are. fully. loved. by. Him (*Psalm 103:17*; 1 John 4:19). This should free you to compete to your full potential. (*Galatians 5:1*)

Jesus' power and love can overflow through your life in all that you do (2 Timothy 1:7; Galatians 5:22). This love doesn't make you play softer, it is a love that roars deep inside of you, waiting to be unleashed...it drives you intrinsically to live and compete with passion, power and purpose (Colossians 1:29; Ephesians 2:4-7).

God is our ever-present Audience of One; who lives in us and shines through us for His glory!



PRINCIPLE #1 AUDIENCE OF ONE God Alone Is Worthy of Your Worship

PRE-GAME WARM UP

Context: In many ways the whole story of the Bible can be seen as a struggle, conflict or even competition, between faith in God (trusting in the God revealed in the Bible) and idolatry (trusting in someone or something other than God to bring deep satisfaction, significance, and success).

Elijah was a prophet who served God during the reign of an evil king named Ahab. The people of God had been straying away from Him and begun worshiping the false gods that had crept into their culture. God tells Elijah to go have a confrontation with the priests/prophets of these false gods.

Read: 1 Kings 18:17-39

¹⁷ When Ahab saw Elijah, Ahab said to him, "Is it you, you troubler of Israel?" ¹⁸ And he answered, "I have not troubled Israel, but you have, and your father's house, because you have abandoned the commandments of the Lord and followed the Baals. 19 Now therefore send and gather all Israel to me at Mount Carmel, and the 450 prophets of Baal and the 400 prophets of Asherah, who eat at Jezebel's table." ²⁰ So Ahab sent to all the people of Israel and gathered the prophets together at Mount Carmel. 21 And Elijah came near to all the people and said, "How long will you go limping between two different opinions? If the Lord is God, follow him; but if Baal, then follow him." And the people did not answer him a word. 22 Then Elijah said to the people, "I, even I only, am left a prophet of the Lord, but Baal's prophets are 450 men. ²³ Let two bulls be given to us, and let them choose one bull for themselves and cut it in pieces and lay it on the wood, but put no fire to it. And I will prepare the other bull and lay it on the wood and put no fire to it. 24 And you call upon the name of your god, and I will call upon the name of the Lord, and the God who answers by fire, he is God." And all the people answered, "It is well spoken." ²⁵ Then Elijah said to the prophets of Baal, "Choose for yourselves one bull and prepare it first, for you are many, and call

upon the name of your god, but put no fire to it." ²⁶ And they took the bull that was given them, and they prepared it and called upon the name of Baal from morning until noon, saying, "O Baal, answer us!" But there was no voice, and no one answered. And they limped around the altar that they had made. ²⁷ And at noon Elijah mocked them, saying, "Cry aloud, for he is a god. Either he is musing, or he is relieving himself, or he is on a journey, or perhaps he is asleep and must be awakened." ²⁸ And they cried aloud and cut themselves after their custom with swords and lances, until the blood gushed out upon them. ²⁹ And as midday passed, they raved on until the time of the offering of the oblation, but there was no voice. No one answered; no one paid attention.

³⁰ Then Elijah said to all the people, "Come near to me." And all the people came near to him. And he repaired the altar of the Lord that had been thrown down. ³¹ Elijah took twelve stones, according to the number of the tribes of the sons of Jacob, to whom the word of the Lord came, saying, "Israel shall be your name," ³² and with the stones he built an altar in the name of the Lord. And he made a trench about the altar, as great as would contain two seahs of seed. ³³ And he put the wood in order and cut the bull in pieces and laid it on the wood. And he said, "Fill four jars with water and pour it on the burnt offering and on the wood." ³⁴ And he said, "Do it a second time." And they did it a second time. And he said, "Do it a third time." And they did it a third time. ³⁵ And the water ran around the altar and filled the trench also with water.

³⁶ And at the time of the offering of the oblation, Elijah the prophet came near and said, "O Lord, God of Abraham, Isaac, and Israel, let it be known this day that you are God in Israel, and that I am your servant, and that I have done all these things at your word. ³⁷ Answer me, O Lord, answer me, that this people may know that you, O Lord, are God, and that you have turned their hearts back." ³⁸ Then the fire of the Lord fell and consumed the burnt offering and the wood and the stones and the dust, and licked up the water that was in the trench. ³⁹ And when all the people saw it, they fell on their faces and said, "The Lord, he is God; the Lord, he is God."

PRINCIPLE #1 AUDIENCE OF ONE God Alone Is Worthy of Your Worship

LAB REFLECTION TIME

- 1. The first move in dealing with idols of the heart is to recognize and acknowledge how we might be manufacturing idols in our minds/hearts/imagination. How might your sport, or other areas of your life, be functioning as a substitute for God?
- 2. Read through the "LIVE IT" chart on the last page. Which areas continue to compete against God being your Audience of One?
- 3. God desires to be your "Audience of One" (read the Ao1 article on page 7 of these notes) in sport, life, work and relationships. In our story in 1 Kings, the people begin to see their need to turn from their idols and start trusting fully in God alone. This "turning from idols" involves a change of your mind, your heart and your will with respect to what is most important.

The Bible says: "If we confess our sins, God is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9).

Take a moment to confess what was true from #1 above and experience God coming down like fire in your life to remove the idols from your heart.

PRE-GAME WARM UP

Read: Luke 15:11-32

¹¹ Jesus continued: "There was a man who had two sons. ¹² The younger one said to his father, 'Father, give me my share of the estate.' So he divided his property between them.

¹³ "Not long after that, the younger son got together all he had, set off for a distant country and there squandered his wealth in wild living. ¹⁴ After he had spent everything, there was a severe famine in that whole country, and he began to be in need. ¹⁵ So he went and hired himself out to a citizen of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed pigs. ¹⁶ He longed to fill his stomach with the pods that the pigs were eating, but no one gave him anything.

¹⁷ "When he came to his senses, he said, 'How many of my father's hired servants have food to spare, and here I am starving to death! ¹⁸ I will set out and go back to my father and say to him: Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. ¹⁹ I am no longer worthy to be called your son; make me like one of your hired servants.' ²⁰ So he got up and went to his father.

"But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him; he ran to his son, threw his arms around him and kissed him.

21 "The son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son.'
 22 "But the father said to his servants, 'Quick! Bring the best robe and put it on him. Put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. ²³ Bring the fattened calf and kill it. Let's have a feast and celebrate. ²⁴ For this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found.' So they began to celebrate.

²⁵ "Meanwhile, the older son was in the field. When he came near the house, he heard music and dancing. ²⁶ So he called one of the servants and asked him what was going on. ²⁷ 'Your brother has come,' he replied,

'and your father has killed the fattened calf because he has him back safe and sound.'

²⁸ "The older brother became angry and refused to go in. So his father went out and pleaded with him. ²⁹ But he answered his father, 'Look! All these years I've been slaving for you and never disobeyed your orders. Yet you never gave me even a young goat so I could celebrate with my friends. ³⁰ But when this son of yours who has squandered your property with prostitutes comes home, you kill the fattened calf for him!'

³¹ "'My son,' the father said, 'you are always with me, and everything I have is yours. ³² But we had to celebrate and be glad, because this brother of yours was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found."

LIVE IT

I must gain my acceptance by proving that I deserve it since my value is always earned, never given.	In Christ, <u>I am accepted</u> by God as a result of His grace toward me - never a result of works - so I do not need to work harder or prove my worth to anyone else. (Ephesians 2:8,9)
I am constantly weighed down by the expectation to perform perfectly, a bondage made worse by the fact that my coach — whose responsibility is to push me toward perfection determines whether I play or not.	In Christ, <u>I am secure</u> because God is in control of the circumstances of my life even when things feel out of control, even when I'm not getting the results I had hoped for in my sport. (Isaiah 40:28-31, 1 Peter 2:18-23
I must compete and live by my own power and strength at all times.	In Christ, I have the power of God within me, and can turn to Him for courage, peace, patience, confidence, self-control and other strengths in any situation, whether in competition or in life. (Colossians 1:29)
I am aware of a sense of competitive loneliness sparked by various internal fears and insecurities - even though I may have teammates and coaches. Deep inside I'm afraid that the only one who truly cares about the real me is the one looking back at me in the mirror.	In Christ, I am never alone because His Spirit lives within me and is a constant presence with me no matter what I deserve or how I perform. (1 Corinthians 6:19; Hebrews 13:5)
I may never be free from my past and may always be marked by my sports mistakes (dropping the ball, missing the play, false start, losing the game, etc.) throughout my career and beyond. I am significant if I am a starter and praised for producing positive results.	In Christ, I am significant because God gives me purpose that transcends my performance, a purpose that flows out of playing a role in His unfolding story. (Ephesians 2:10; Ephesians 1:11)
I exist in a world where you only live once and what's happening at this moment - in sports or life - is the most important thing. I must compete with everyone around me in order to get what's mine right now.	In Christ, <u>I have eternal life</u> , a life that begins now and extends forever into the future long after my earthly body dies, so I should invest in the spiritual lives of people instead of just the material pursuit of trophies. (1 John 5:13)
I am relentlessly pursuing personal goals with the hope that they will provide lasting satisfaction. I chase a contentment that depends on gaining enough accolades to validate my success—even though I know that no amount of worldly achievement will ever be enough.	In Christ, <u>I am satisfied in Him</u> , content to find my identity in what He says is true about me, being freed to passionately pursue goals without expecting those goals to ultimately complete me. (Psalm 34:8-10, Philippians 4:11,12)

PRINCIPLE #3 HOLY SWEAT (WHOLLY SURRENDER)

God Provides Resources for Soul Training to Help You Grow

PRE-GAME WARM UP

Read: 1 Timothy 4:8

⁸ for while bodily training is of some value, godliness is of value in every way, as it holds promise for the present life and also for the life to come.

Read: John 14:15-26

At 17 years old Joseph was his father's favorite son among 12 brothers. Joseph had several dreams that one day he would rule over his brothers. So he tells his brothers about these dreams of him ruling over them one day. They got so angry with him that they decided to get rid of him and they sold him into slavery. He is shipped off to Egypt where he ends up as a slave to a man named Potiphar, who was the captain of the guard for Pharaoh. Joseph was a handsome young man (good looking brother) and he ended up getting framed for rape and sent off to prison and forgotten about. He continued to have dreams from God. 13 years later Pharoah, the king of Egypt had a disturbing dream that no one could interpret or explain for him. But one of his servant's had met a prisoner. named Joseph, who could interpret dreams for people. Pharaoh summoned Joseph, and was so impressed with his insights that he removed him from prison and elevated him to be governor over Egypt. With God's wisdom, Joseph wisely stored up grain in Egypt for seven years before a famine struck the Middle East. FOCAL POINTS

FOCAL POINT: A visual reminder to keep a Godly perspective

Ask: How can I keep my focus on Christ during competition?

Read: Hebrews 12:1-2 "Focus your eyes on Jesus" **Theme:** A focal point can help reframe your perspective **Live It:** Pick a focal point and look at it as often as needed

Throughout the Bible, God exhorts us to remember His presence with us and remember all that He has done. Hebrews 12:1,2 tells us to "focus our eyes on Jesus". A Focal Point can help with this. A Focal Point is a visual reminder of a Biblical truth. Using a focal point can help remind you that God is present with you, wherever you are. It can also remind you of your identity in Christ.

A visual focal point could be a cross on your shoe, a scar on your arm, tattoo on your body, a piece of sporting equipment, or a tree by your practice eld, etc. You want to make sure that whatever you pick for a focal point is something that can quickly bring your mind back to God with just a quick look. A focal point isn't supposed to take your focus off of the game you are in. Rather it should help you focus your intensity more in the right direction, with added motivation that comes from remembering who you are and why God has put you in your sport. It also needs to be located in a spot that is easy for you to see it, so that when you need to refocus, you can simply glance at it and keep going.

In preparation before your practice or competition starts, you'll want to take a couple of minutes to locate a good focal point and think through what it will remind you of and how that will motivate you. Some people use a different one each day. Some use the same one for awhile. Soon you will have several favorite ones to choose from that work best for you.

Down Time is Reset Time: depending on your sport, the best time to look at your focal point is when there is "down time" or a break in the action (time out, out of bounds, penalty shots, etc.). Just like anything it will take practice, practice, practice. As you get more comfortable using a focal point, it will get easier for you to know how it works best for you.

HOW TO PREPARE AND PRESENT YOUR PERSONAL TESTIMONY

I. WHY ARE YOU QUALIFIED TO TESTIFY?

- A. In 1 Peter 3:15, the Apostle Paul instructs us to always be ready "to make a defense to everyone who asks you to give an account for the hope that is in you, yet with gentleness and reverence."
- B. Your personal testimony is one of the most effective means you have for making such a defense of your faith in Jesus Christ. There are times when an individual is not willing to sit down and go through a Gospel tract or when doing so would be inappropriate. However, people are often more interested in knowing your story: how you came to put your faith in Christ and the difference that decision has made in your life.
- C. There are numerous examples of individuals sharing their testimony throughout the New Testament. Who is giving the following testimonies and who is listening to them?
 - 1. John 4:39-42
 - 2. John 9:24-34
 - 3. Galatians 11:13-2:21
 - 4. Acts 21:40-22:21
 - 5. Acts 24:10-16; 24:24
- D. What are some situations where you might be able to share your personal testimony?

II. A BIBLICAL EXAMPLE OF A THREE POINT TESTIMONY

The Apostle Paul's testimony serves as a good example. When he shared his story, he presented a logical and simple defense for the hope within him. Generally he spoke of his life before Christ, how he came to know Christ, and his life since accepting Christ.

- A. Notice the outline in Acts 21:37-22:21:
 - 1. Acts 22:1-5: Paul shares about his life before accepting Christ.
 - 2. Acts 22:6-11: Paul shares how he became a believer.
 - 3. Acts 22:12-22: Paul shares how his life changed after accepting Christ.
- B. Can you find a similar outline in Acts 26:2-29?

III. HOW TO WRITE YOUR OWN TESTIMONY

As shown above, your testimony can logically be divided into three parts: before accepting Christ, how you accepted Christ, and after accepting Christ.

- A. **Before:** This section covers what your life was like before you accepted Christ. The following questions may help you think through what you want to convey:
 - 1. What were the unmeet needs in your life? Some possibilities include: loneliness, lack of significance, lack of purpose, a sense of emptiness, fear of death, aimlessness, lack of peace etc.
 - How did you attempt to have these needs met? Some possibilities include: accomplishments, accumulation of wealth or things, drugs, alcohol, sex, finding fulfillment in work, education, athletics, etc.
- B. How: This section describes the circumstances and events that caused you to consider Christ and the steps you took to become a Christian. Included in this section is a brief but clear presentation of the gospel.

C. **After:** This section explains the changes that have occurred in your life since receiving Christ. This should relate back to the specific issues you discussed in the "before" section.

IV. IMPORTANT "DOS AND DON'TS"

When writing and giving your personal testimony there are some basic "dos and don'ts" which will make it more effective.

A. Do:

- 1. Keep your testimony concise. Three minutes is sufficient time to tell your story. (Read Paul's testimonies outloud. You will notice that none of them are more than three minutes!)
- 2. Begin with an interesting attention-getting sentence.
- 3. Be realistic.
- 4. Be positive from start to finish.
- 5. Emphasize the difference that Christ has made in your life.
- 6. You may consider using one Scripture in your testimony.

B. Don't:

- Use Christian terminology. For the most part it will be meaningless to a non-Christian. For example, words like born-again, saved, etc.
- 2. Preach at people. Instead share your story with them.
- 3. Use negative statements about churches, specific denominations, other organizations or people.
- 4. Give the impression that the Christian life is without problems.
- 5. Be long-winded. Keep your testimony concise.

V. PRESENTING YOUR TESTIMONY

- A. Remember, we are admonished to always be ready to give an account for the hope within us. Therefore, you should always be ready to share your testimony. The following suggestions will help you be prepared:
 - 1. Memorize your testimony.
 - 2. Rehearse your testimony until it becomes natural.
 - 3. Practice you testimony with a friend.
- B. When the opportunity arises to share your testimony, remember the following:
 - 1. Share your testimony in the power of the Holy Spirit. Ask Him to speak to the heart of those listening.
 - 2. Be relaxed. Smile
 - 3. Avoid nervous mannerisms.

SHARING YOUR FAITH



Evangelism has become a scary word in our culture. People's first response, even many Christians, is usually to envision someone on a street corner yelling at people about going to hell, or trying to push beliefs on people. Those negative pictures are not what Jesus modeled for us and certainly not what He is asking us to do. The following passage will explain God's heart and our responsibility in sharing our faith.

Read 2 Corinthians 5:11-21 and answer the following questions:

- What reason does Paul give in verse 11 for talking to people about God?
- In verse 14, what is Paul's motivation for sharing His faith?
- What do you think Paul means by the "ministry of reconciliation?"

In summary, Paul is saying that he is motivated by love for Christ to let other people know about the great gift that God offers us. Furthermore, we have been entrusted with the good news that God sent Jesus to die for us, and that by accepting Him, we can be forgiven of our sins and live forever as God's child. Evangelism is nothing more than taking, and at times, making opportunities to let people know what God has done for them and to offer them the chance to accept it. This is both a great privilege and a great responsibility.

WHAT EXACTLY IS THE GOSPEL?

Imagine that someone you cared about came up to you and said, "You know, I've really noticed that there is something different about you. I know that you are a Christian, and I would really like to start a relationship with God, too. What do I do?" Would you know what to tell them?

Many people think that their way of sharing their faith is to live a good life. How we live our lives is an incredibly important part of sharing our faith. However, the Bible is clear that we all have a responsibility to share the gospel in words as well. Read Matthew 28:18-20. This verse is sometimes referred to as the Great Commission and applies to all believers. In verse 20, He tells His disciples to teach all of their disciples to obey everything He commanded them to do, which includes the command to "go and make disciples of all nations..." Part of making disciples is explaining to them how to begin a relationship with God. Also among the last recorded words of Jesus is Acts 1:8. Here, Jesus informs His disciples that they will receive the Holy Spirit, who will empower them to be His witnesses. A witness, just like in a court of law, is one who tells what he or she has seen or experienced. We received the Holy Spirit when we placed our faith in Christ, and just as in the days of the original disciples, we are now empowered to be His witnesses.

If we all have a responsibility to share the gospel in words, it is important that we have a clear understanding of exactly what the gospel is and be able to communicate it clearly to others. AlA uses several different booklets, each of which has a very clear, four point summary of the gospel. This study looks at the "Knowing God Personally" booklet.

USING THE "KNOWING GOD PERSONALLY" BOOKLET

I. GENERAL PRINCIPLES

- A. Use the booklet to guide a conversation instead of reading straight through it. The conversation is meant to be a dialogue, not a monologue.
- B. Pray as you go and ask the Holy Spirit to speak through you and to open the heart of the person you are sharing with.
- C. Stay on track. Some people will ask questions that are hard to answer and take attention away from the basic message of the gospel. It's ok to say that you don't know, and it's also ok to ask if you can try to answer that question after you've finished the booklet.
- D. It is not always necessary to use the booklet, but it is a good idea to at least give the booklet to people so they have something to refer back to that has Bible verses and specific instructions on how to begin a relationship with God.

II. INTRODUCING THE BOOKLET

Whether sharing with a stranger or a friend or family member, you want to start by listening. Ask the person questions about what they believe about God or what they think it means to be a Christian. At some point, you will need to transition to the gospel. Telling your testimony (the story of how you became a Christian) can be a natural and easy transition. After you tell your story, you can say something like, "When I mentioned having a 'relationship with God' what did that mean to you? Would you like to know what that means?" Another great series of transitional questions are: "If you were to die tonight, how sure are you that you would go to heaven?" and, "If God asked you why He should let you in, what would you say?" The point here is that most people will answer that they have tried to be a good person, which is the opposite of the gospel message. You can tell them here that God has made a way for them to be 100% sure of going to heaven. Most people will be very interested in that.

III. GOING THROUGH THE FOUR LAWS

Overview of the four points:

God's plan: God loves you and wants to know you personally Our problem: Sin separates everyone from God God's solution: Jesus is God's only provision for our sins Our response: We must individually receive Jesus

- A. Read through the first point. You may want to have them read the verses. Ask the question at the bottom.

 Try to affirm what you can about their answer. If they are off, don't agree with them or argue with them, just go on to the next point.
- B. Read through the second point. After reading the first verse a good question is "How would you define sin?" You can respond with the archery illustration: Sin comes from a Greek archery term that means "to miss the mark." God's standard is perfection, and sin is anything that falls short of God's standard. Continue reading the paragraph on the first page and then read the explanation of the diagram.
- C. Read through the third point. You can ask some clarifying questions here, such as "According to what we just read, why did Jesus have to die?" The point is to emphasize that Jesus died in our place to satisfy God's perfect justice. You can use an illustration here about God being a judge who has to make sure the crime you committed is paid for, but knowing that you couldn't pay it yourself, sent His son to pay it for you.

D. Read through the fourth point. You can stop at the second verse and define grace (an undeserved gift), saved (saved from what? Death, which we talked about in the second point), and faith (more than intellectual belief, which is described more in detail on the following page). If you asked the questions about how sure they are they would go to heaven, you can bring up their answers here. You can say that the only answer that would get you into heaven is that you accepted Christ's payment for your sins. It is impossible to earn our way into heaven.

IV. HELPING SOMEONE MAKE A DECISION

A. Read the descriptions of the two circles at the bottom of the page. Do not focus on the "interests" but on who is on the throne. When you ask the first question at the bottom, most people want to say they are somewhere in the middle. The important point here is not what the two lives look like, but whether or not Jesus is in the circle. A good clarifying question is, "Is there a time that you asked Jesus into your life?"

If they say yes, ask them what that was like for them. If they seem to have a genuine relationship with God but are struggling to live out their faith, you may want to go through the Holy Spirit booklet with them, invite them to a Bible study or set up another time to meet.

If they say no, continue on to the second question:

Which circle would you like to represent your life?

If they say they want to have Christ in their lives (circle on the right), go to the next page.

If they say they are content without Him (circle on the left), ask them if you can finish anyway. They may change their minds one day and at least they will know what to do at that time.

B. Read through everything on the next page. Some people may want to pray with you on the spot. If not, make sure you or someone else tries to follow up with them at a later time. If they do pray, or say they are going to on their own, keep reading through at least the next two pages, which explain some of the things that happen when we receive Christ. If you are not going to see this person again, encourage them to start reading the Bible, suggest the gospel of John, and encourage them to find a church.

Additional insight on sharing the gospel, as well as more illustrations that may be helpful to use while you are sharing with someone can be found on-line at www.aia.com . It is always a step of faith to share the gospel but we do it because people need Jesus. Romans 10:14-15 says, "How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can they preach unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"
